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**SUMMARY & BACKGROUND**

On March 11, 2021, the President signed into law the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARP). ARP makes available \$122.8 billion nationally in a third round of Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) funds. New York State has been allocated nearly \$9 billion under the ARP Act's Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) Fund. The ARP Act requires that a minimum of \$8.09 billion (90 percent) be allocated to LEAs, including charter schools and Special Act School Districts that are LEAs. Pursuant to the terms of the ARP Act, LEA allocations have been calculated using the relative shares of grants awarded under Title I, Part A of the ESEA for the most recent federal fiscal year (2020). Each eligible LEA's ARP-ESSER allocation may be found [HERE](#).

Under section 2001(d)(2) of ARP Act of 2021, each State Educational Agency (SEA) must make ARP-ESSER allocations to LEAs in an expedited and timely manner and, to the extent practicable, not later than 60 days after the SEA receives its ARP-ESSER funds. The first portion of ARP-ESSER Funds was awarded to states on March 24, 2021, and 60 days from that day is May 24, 2021. The U.S. Department of Education (USDE) has taken the position that an SEA makes allocations when it authorizes the LEA to begin to obligate funds in accordance with its needs. To enable New York State's LEAs to begin to obligate ARP-ESSER funds by USDE's May 24, 2021 deadline, the application for LEA 90% base ARP-ESSER allocations is being administered by NYSED as a two-part application process:

**ARP-ESSER Application – Part 1:** The first step was for each LEA to submit signed assurances to NYSED by May 24, 2021. Upon receipt of signed LEA assurances, NYSED provided an email notice to the LEA of substantially approvable application status. Upon receipt of such notice, LEAs were able to begin obligating their allocation of 90% base ARP-ESSER funds.

**ARP-ESSER Application – Part 2:** The second step will be the submission of a full application and budget by the LEA. NYSED will issue a Grant Award Notice (GAN) to the LEA after the LEA's application is fully reviewed and approved by NYSED. Part 2 will address several of the plan-related assurances an LEA must provide in Part 1 of the application process.

The ARP Act requires LEAs to reserve at least 20% of their 90% ARP-ESSER allocation to address learning loss through the implementation of evidence-based interventions, such as summer learning or summer enrichment, extended day, comprehensive afterschool programs, or extended school year programs, and ensure that such interventions respond to students' academic, social, and emotional needs and address the disproportionate impact of the coronavirus on economically disadvantaged students, children with disabilities, English learners, racial and ethnic minorities, migrant students, students experiencing homelessness, and children and youth in foster care. Title VIII of Division B of the CARES Act directs the Department to carry out the Education Stabilization Fund, of which the ARP ESSER funds are a part. Section 2001 of the ARP Act provides for the Department to make grants to each SEA from the ARP ESSER funds. - 3. In the space provided below, please describe the extent to which and how the funds will be used to implement prevention and mitigation strategies that are, to the greatest extent practicable, consistent with the most recent CDC guidance on reopening schools, in order to continuously and safely open and operate schools for in-person learning.**

A portion of the funds will be utilized to safely open and operate schools for in-person learning in a variety of ways. We intend to create outdoor classroom spaces in both the Elementary and Jr. Senior High Schools to assist with creating learning environments in which virus transmission is minimal. In addition, we intend to remove Vinyl Asbestos Tile (VAT) as well as Vinyl Composition Tile (VCT) that has deteriorated. Removing the VAT will eliminate a possible hazard from the school and the warped VCT tile, due to its status, is difficult to properly sanitize. We also intend to purchase 10 additional portable radios to assist in emergency communications, as well as purchasing identification software to assist with identification.

The data that the LEA will use to identify student needs and monitor student progress as a result of the planned interventions and supports will be reflected in the customization and implementation of the Modern Learning Survey provided by BrightBytes. This survey will be administered by Hoosic Valley Central Schools on 10/1/21 and will survey stakeholders within the Hoosic Valley Central School District. This survey will be open for response for approximately two weeks. Responses to the Modern Learning Survey will then be analyzed as per the varying categories: Access, Support, Instruction, SEL, Digital Citizenship, and Professional Development. Our district's greatest needs in these categories will, in turn, reflect our spending.

In addition to the Modern Learning Survey, the Coordinator of Educational Technology will be issuing faculty members a needs assessment to assist the enhancement of their in class and potential remote instruction. This faculty needs assessment will inform the Coordinator of Educational Technology of pedagogical practices utilized by specific teachers and how to move forward and provide support in best teaching practices via the utilization of software for student learning and engagement. Data from this needs assessment will be analyzed and inform the purchase of technology and professional development.

Student progress will be monitored via surveys, benchmarking software such as Ed Vista, i-Ready (Math and RTI) and other various software applications.

Hoosic Valley CSD will address lost instructional time through a variety of methods. We are hiring 1 Math Intervention Teacher to assist with math deficiencies at the Elementary level; implementing an extended day program for the High School, creating a math lab at the high school, as well as enhancing our Summer School Offerings. We also seek to implement the Homegrown Institute professional development, which has a focus on reading.

In addition to our endeavors to address the impact of lost instructional time, we are seeking to hire 1 additional social-emotional practitioner for the duration of the grant period to assist students disproportionately impacted. The additional social-emotional practitioner will provide explicit SEL support to students at the secondary level using a multi-tiered systems of support approach. The practitioner will individually respond to those students with pre-existing social emotional difficulties by providing direct counseling targeting individual student needs. The position will also be leveraged to promote SEL competencies to all students, by researching and systematically implementing an SEL curriculum. This individual will serve as a liaison to provide disadvantaged families with community based resources to support the needs and development of the whole child. These funds will help those students disproportionately impacted by the pandemic in a number of ways. The additional school social worker will provide more emotional supports to children in varying degrees of need. Wellness activities will have impacts on both staff and students physical and emotional well-being.

**Summary and Background Information**

On March 11, 2021, the President signed into law the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARP). ARP makes available \$122.8 billion nationally in a third round of Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) funds. New York State has been allocated nearly \$9 billion under the ARP Act's Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) Fund.

The federal ARP statute requires that States reserve ARP ESSER funds for three State-level reservations for evidence-based activities and interventions that respond to students' social, emotional, mental health, and academic needs and address the disproportionate impact of COVID-19 on students from low-income families, students of color, English learners, children with disabilities, students experiencing homelessness, children and youth in foster care, and migratory students.

Not less than 5 percent of the State's grant must be reserved to carry out, directly or through subgrants or contracts, activities to address the academic impact of lost instructional time by supporting the implementation of evidence-based interventions.

Not less than 1 percent of the State's grant must be reserved to carry out, directly or through subgrants or contracts, the implementation of evidence-based summer enrichment programs.

Not less than 1 percent of the State's grant must be reserved to carry out, directly or through subgrants or contracts, the implementation of evidence-based comprehensive after-school programs.

Students in these studies have not been randomly assigned, but researchers have used statistical matching methods that allow them to speak with confidence that the strategy results in an improved outcome. These studies meet the What Works Clearinghouse evidence standards with reservations. The studies use large, multi-site samples. No

other studies show that this strategy negatively impacts an outcome.

**Tier 3 - Promising Evidence:** Supported by at least one well designed, well implemented correlational study with statistical controls for selection bias. There is evidence that this strategy improves a student outcome (reading scores, attendance rates), but that research may consist of correlational studies -- studies can show a relationship between the strategy and outcome but cannot show that the improved outcome was the result of the strategy. The studies supporting Tier 3 strategies do not have to be based on large, multi-site samples. A strategy that would otherwise be considered Tier 1 or Tier 2, but it does not meet sample size requirements, is considered Tier 3. No other studies show that this strategy negatively impacts an outcome.

**Tier 4 - Demonstrates a Rationale:** High-quality research findings or positive evaluation suggests that this will likely improve student outcomes or other relevant outcomes; and there are ongoing efforts to examine the effects of such activity, strategy, or intervention. Based on existing research, the intervention cannot yet be defined as a Tier 1, Tier 2 or Tier 3. However, there is good reason to believe — based on existing research and data — that the intervention could improve relevant student outcomes.

Further information may be found in the **Federal Guidance on Evidence-Based Interventions**. There are a number of resources available that identify research which supports specific interventions. Districts and schools are encouraged to review the various clearinghouses to find programs, strategies, and interventions that align with the needs identified during the needs assessment process. Summer learning programs can offer another opportunity to accelerate learning, especially for those students most impacted by disruptions to learning during the school year. Schools and districts should design programs that work best in the local context and reflect the characteristics that evidence suggests lead to successful summer programs. These characteristics include: programs are voluntary, full-day lasting five to six weeks, include three hours of language arts and mathematics taught by a certified teacher each day, and include enrichment activities and experiences. Research points to the potentially positive benefits of strong summer programs. A longitudinal study of summer programs showed students who participated in the summer programs that were reviewed received some benefits in mathematics; however, students with high rates of attendance who attended programs for consecutive summers experienced the greatest learning gains. The amount and quality of instruction influenced the academic benefit, with the highest benefits to students attending programs with high-quality instruction provided by a certified teacher and high academic time on task.
